ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING TUESDAY 17 SEPTEMBER 7.30PM

SPECIAL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 20 AUGUST

34 members attended this meeting, which was called by request of some members who wanted to discuss the proposed extension to the club, and the future of the permanent butts.

There was a great deal of lively debate, effectively moderated by President Daniel Caon. The following issues were clarified:

The proposed extensions will provide storage for about 10 mobile butts, as well as new toilet facilities which include disabled access.

The extensions will be partially funded by the club, but most of the money will come from grants. Once the plans are finalised we can apply for a grant. If the grant application is unsuccessful, the building will only proceed if we can find another source of funding. A reserve of about \$60,000 would be retained by the club. We currently have a reserve of

\$120,000

Depending on the amount of the grant, should we get it, fit-out (shelves, new window shutters etc) can be installed as additional funds become available.

Day to day expenses of running of the club would not be affected by the proposed extension. These are budgeted for annually against projected income. This year there is an expected surplus of \$4000.00.


The immediate issue of giving compound shooters access to mobile butts - safer for their arrows – when practicing outside of programmed shoots can be resolved by altering the double door locking system to allow access.



The existing fixed butts are in urgent need of upgrading. There is enough money in the grounds budget (\$10,000 this year) to cover the design, construction and installation of at least 2 replacement butts per year. HOWEVER this will not happen unless volunteers step forward to organise it. Club officers cannot be expected to undertake this task on top of their other duties.

The decision whether to proceed to the next stage of the planning process (which has to be completed before we can apply for a grant) will be made at the AGM (noted above). If you want to have your say, come the meeting next month.

QUALIFYING AND RANKING EVENT (QRE)

Adelaide Archery Club was a busy place on 27 July, with a 25 archers shooting a QRE in addition to those shooting the scheduled club rounds. The QRE attracted archers from seven different clubs, with Graham Winston fulfilling the role of QRE Official.

The event was also used to successfully trial new timing equipment recently secured by Archery SA

Chris de Mello shot an outstanding round, scoring 623 in a WA70/720, a result that saw him jump to 12th on the National Ranking List for male recurve across all age types – well done Chris!

And Paul Bergin comes up trumps most weeks when he brings his wonderful rock cakes and other goodies to share at the shooting break and meetings




The Farm Archery Golf Day

The Bows

There are three types of bows here this week and can be seen shooting on the line together

The Longbow: Made of wood.

The Recurve Bow: A faster bow, usually with a metal handle, the limbs are often wood reinforced with fibreglass or carbon but other materials may be used.

The Compound Bow: with mechanical cams.



Due to their differences in accuracy and speed they do not shoot against each other but have separate competition on the same day!






Circa 1947 Alex shooting with sights

Alex Barter OAM. Founding member of Archery Association of Australia Board Member, Pioneer of first Sth. Australian Club.

Longest serving Board Member of Archery Association of Australia. 1948 - 1986.

1944, Alex Barter was a founding member of the first archery club in South Australia, the Adelaide Archery Club. He was also one of the driving forces behind formation of a National body, with the first meeting of the National Council being held at his home, August 1948. As South Australia's first Board member of the Archery Association of Australia formed in 1948, he became the longest serving member holding the position from 1948 to 1986. He was founding member of the Rules Committee (from 1948) and significantly contributed to the preparation of the first National Constitution and Rules. Retiring Chairman in 1988. 1965 Alex & Edie took over publishing of the bi-monthly 'Shooting Lines.' A nationally distributed archery magazine. A role they maintained until 1989. Alex was President of Archery South Australia for 23 years. In 1967 Alex was honoured with Life Membership of AAA also Adelaide Archery Club and Archery South Australia. Awarded FITA Plaquette and Order of Australia Medal. He also was awarded the Australian Sports 2000 Medal.


